Resilient Thinking to Achieve Peak Performance Colonial Room





Dan Ventrelle Oakland Raiders



After 14 years, he finds himself not only overseeing the legal department of the Oakland Raiders, but also a key player on the personnel front and a primary driver of the team's efforts to build a new stadium."

"On the business side, I structure deals for our stadium project and oversee the legal and human resources departments. On the football side, my responsibilities include negotiating both players' and coaches' contracts, working closely with our head coach. general manager, and director of football administration," says Ventrelle.
